We got a late start as I had to put in a partial work day in DC. By the time we really got on the road it was 6:30 PM. I watched the temperature gauge drop from 103 degrees to the mid 80's the further west we traveled. At around 9:30 PM we finally arrived at camp finding the rest of the crew was already settled in. Many thanks to Keith and Tom Taylor for helping us setup camp in the dark. Friday night was spent around the camp fire enjoying the company of familiar friends swapping stories.



On Saturday morning we awoke to a beautiful day. Signs were good for a clear day but a bit hot. After breakfast, we hit the road for our assigned morning volunteer work detail. This year the MD DNR assigned us the task of clearing a mile or so of snowmobile trails of encroaching overgrowth. The MD DNR provided a wide variant of hand tools and we provided the manpower. We cut back small trees that and trimmed low hanging branches. Occasionally, Preston utilized his chainsaw to remove larger logs that had fallen across the trail.

His front tire reached across but could not pull the Cherokee up the other side. Now he was stuck.

Work continued until about 12 noon when hit the end of the trail. At his point we all piled into the back of Tom's Cherokee pickup truck and headed down the road back to the trail head where we all left our vehicles. We headed back to camp for a short lunch break before hitting trails. Preston took the lead and we headed to our first trail destination, Rattlesnake Ridge. To get to this trail you first had to cross a decent size creek with several large boulders strewn about. Once across, we proceeded up a rocky hill climb. He we continued the volunteering spirit clearing fallen trees that had blocked the fire trail.

Here vehicle problems plagued Tom's Bronco. At first the starter solenoid would not disengage so his starter would remain engaged after the vehicle started. Being an expert handyman Tom figured out how to get the vehicle started and the solenoid disengaged. Starting the Bronco was now a two person job. Deb who turned the key and Tom who disconnected the solenoid wire immediately after engine started.



Rattlesnake Ridge is characterized by a steep and long uphill climb. For safety reasons we only allow one vehicle at a time to attempt the hill climb. The first four vehicles in our group made it up the hill fine. However, Tom at the end of the group started to experience a vapor lock issue with the Bronco at the base of the hill. Once the engine got hot, it was impossible to keep it running. The fact that it was in the mid 90's did not help. He was at the bottom of Rattlesnake Ridge with a vehicle that would not start.

There was nothing to do except wait the 15-20 minutes for the engine to cool down before attempting to restart the engine. Tom did get the Bronco running and quickly made a mad scramble to climb the hill. He made it three fourths way up hill before the engine conked out again due to the vapor lock issue. We debated situation and after waiting some more time for the cool down time. However the combination of being on the hill and the hot weather the engine would not cooperate. So we decided to hook a tow strap to the rear of my Jeep and the front of Tom's Bronco. We were still on an uphill climb so I had concerns that my Rubicon would not be able to pull Tom's built up Bronco with 4 passengers up the remainder of the hill. But pleasantly to my surprise with low range, first gear, and four wheel drive, the Rubicon pulled the Bronco up hill, through the remainder of trail, and back to camp.

The next planned event for the weekend was to hit the swimming hole on the Potomac River. We parked the

vehicles at the end of a gravel road, walked across a creek, and hiked a short bit to the banks of the Potomac River. A few hundred yards south on the river was an awesome water hole that was well attended with lots of folks enjoying a late summer dip. We jumped in and enjoyed the refreshing swim. I watched as Preston and Emily would climb on the large boulders along the river bank and bravely jump feet first into the river some 15-20 feet below.

After our swim we had another opportunity to hit the trails. At the end of the road where we parked our vehicles, was another fire trail. We entered this trail and immediately saw the first situation; a berm crossed the trail. On the right side it was very deep and steep. On the left side it more shallow but still would be tricky to cross.



Preston being up for a challenge attempted to cross the berm on the right side. The front end of the Cherokee dropped into berm. His front tire reached across but could not pull the Cherokee up the other side. Now he was stuck. The Cherokee could not climb out forward or back. Since my Rubicon was next in line, we pulled out the tow strap attached it to the front of my Jeep and to the rear of the Cherokee. A gentle tug back pulled the Cherokee back off the berm. Preston this time took the left line and cleared the berm fine.

We all made it across this first berm and proceeded down the train a bit more, only to find a second berm; this time deeper and even more tricky than first. Recognizing that we all would have difficulty crossing this berm we shoved a mammoth sized boulder in middle of deepest section of berm in order to give the right set of tires some to ride across so they would not drop all the way in and get seriously hung up.

All made it across. Keith's longer wheel base pickup struggled more since the undercarriage would hang up after the front wheels cleared the ascent of the berm. Eventually Keith got the Colorado through with a bit of momentum and taking a different line.

We proceeded along trail and eventually came across a tree that had fallen across the trail. Again the chainsaw was put to use to clear the tree off the trail. Further

Let's all pull together and make sure that our children, and our children's children, will be able to appreciate and enjoy these beautiful lands of ours too.

## Right here. Right now.

It's up to each us to change our image and do what we can to see to it that the sport of 4-wheeling seen in a positive light, rather than a negative one.

#### Here are 9 simple ways that one person can help to increase public awareness of the issue of offroaders' rights to use the land too:

- 1. Start **an e-mail contact list** of friends and family who are interested in learning more about this issue. When you come across articles, news, or relevant information, forward it to everyone on this list.
- 2. Add a catchy phrase or quote that's meaningful to you into the tagline of your emails. A thing as simple as an e-mail signature will remind others of the importance of this issue. You'd be surprised by the impact of such a simple thing!
- 3. Make your own website in support of the cause. Here's a <u>great example</u> (<u>http://www.otisfordsucks.com/</u>) of a simple website that was created solely for the purpose of educating the public and making a point. Whether you already know how to make websites, or you've always wanted to know how, but didn't know where to start... There's no time like the present. Now you've got a focus for your new website! There are literally thousands of how-to sites on the Internet to get you started, and with all the free templates available and free server space provided by email providers these days, there's no reason to put it off any longer.

You can even add a colorful "web sticker" on your website to make it easy for others to contact their elected officials. There's <u>a web</u> <u>sticker for federal representatives</u>

(http://www.congress.org/congressorg/remotec ontent/) and <u>a web sticker for contacting state</u> representatives

(http://www.congress.org/congressorg/dbq/stic kers/?command=statestickers).

If you (or your club) already have a website, then do your duty and include relevant information about local land issues. Not only will you be serving as a role model, you have no idea all the people you'll be helping to educate about this topic. We all need to get the word out, and this is one way that takes very little effort.

- 4. Call **radio talk shows**. Ask questions. Make a statement. Be courteous and professional even if the host disagrees with you, but be firm on the issues. This is simply another way to get the word out and tell your story.
- Put a meaningful bumper sticker on your vehicle and ask your friends, family, and neighbors if they will also put a **bumper sticker** on their cars. To get more bumper stickers, <u>check here</u> (<u>http://4wheeldrive.about.com/od/bumpersticke</u> <u>rs/Bumper Stickers For 4x4s and 4Wheeler</u> <u>s\_Car\_Vehicle\_Decals.htm</u>).
- Attend local political and community meetings. Make friends. Without forcing your agenda on others, it's important to speak up about the issue whenever it's appropriate. When people ask for more information, have something ready to hand them.
- 7. If you or someone in your local 4-wheeling club is talented at public speaking, arrange to **give a presentation** at the local library, local lodge or community event. Most public libraries will reserve a meeting room at no charge where you can show a video and give a presentation. Be sure to submit your event announcement to the local media and post flyers around town so that people know about it.
- Call or write your local newspapers and television stations (http://www.congress.org/congressorg/dbq/me dia/). The media is always looking for human-interest stories. Tell your story. If you have two or three others who also have a story to tell, offer to arrange a meeting over coffee with the reporter and a small group for interviews. Try to develop a friendly, professional relationship with the local media -

even if some disagree with you.

9. Create a "buzz" about land issues. **Start a word of mouth campaign** simply by telling your friends, your family, and your co-workers about local land issues. And ask them to tell someone too. Pass it on!

# Positive outlook at final AOAA meeting

COAL TOWNSHIP - If approved by the Northumberland County commissioners and proper funding is secured, the proposed Anthracite Outdoor Adventure Area (AOAA) covering more than 6,000 acres in five local townships could generate \$5.2 million and create 184 new jobs over a five-year period.

That optimistic projection was revealed Wednesday night at a public meeting attended by approximately 200 people in the auditorium at Shamokin Area Middle/High School to discuss the master plan for the AOAA.

In addition to revenue and employment projections for the AOAA, a fee schedule to use the outdoor facility, funding sources and a tentative opening date were announced by officials from Pashek Associates of Pittsburgh, who conducted the 90-minute presentation in conjunction with county planning director Pat Mack, AOAA project coordinator Kathy Jeremiah and Steve Barber, regional vice president for Pennoni Associates of Mechanicsburg.

Mack opened the program by stating, "The status quo of the property is not acceptable. In addition to providing an outdoor adventure area in the county, this project, which has been in the works for 1 1/2 years, will help alleviate dumping and burning on the property. We need to stick to this plan."

Prior to the meeting, Mack said the 332-page master plan developed by Pashek Associates cost \$238,000. He said a \$200,000 grant from the state Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) and a *continued on page 9*

\$38,000 grant from the state Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) were used to pay for the plan.

The county, which was seeking \$3.5 million in grant

funding for the AOAA, received \$400,000 late last year from DCNR.

The \$400,000 came from state snowmobile and ATV funds. The largest source of potential funding would have been from Growing Greener II; however, the state has not renewed that fund, which will be depleted this year.

In June, the county received a \$20,000 Yamaha Off-Highway Vehicle Access Initiative Grant for trail development, mapping and signage in AOAA. The county also was awarded a \$10,000 Polaris TRAILS Program grant for trail design and development.

Mack said pending funding applications include a \$1,500,000 DCNR grant, \$300,000 ARC/DCED grant (access road funding) and \$1,300,000 grant for an abandoned mine reclamation project at Boyer's Knob.

Mack pointed out that no county money will be spent on the AOAA.

John Buerkle, principal of Pashek Associates in charge of site planning, said the master plan contains recommendations for 6,596 acres of county-owned property in Coal, Mount Carmel, Zerbe, East Cameron and West Cameron townships that officials hope will become a formalized venue for motorized and nonmotorized recreation activities.

If additional funding is secured for the project, the AOAA trailhead would be located off Route 125 on the Burnside Mountain south of Shamokin.

Buerkle said the plan includes facility and activity areas, Phase I funding and development, rules for use of the AOAA, safety and security procedures for visitors to the outdoor adventure area, a proposed fee structure to cover operating and maintenance expenses and future capital development, and the projected economic impact to Northumberland County.

He said, "We want to make this a world-class facility. The AOAA will contain 318 miles of trail, 50 of which will be for non-motorized usage."

Buerkle said the land also will have 27 miles of access roads and 15 miles of equestrian trails.

He explained 41 percent of the AOAA will be used for ATVs, 27 percent for full-size vehicles and 32 percent for off-highway vehicles.

The proposed admission fee schedule for the AOAA is

## as follows:

- \$25 for a one-day pass, \$40 for a two-day pass, \$80 for an annual pass, \$10 for a spectator/non-motorized day pass, and \$25 for a spectator/non-motorized annual pass.

Buerkle said implementing the master plan will formalize and secure public access to the land for current and future residents of the county, provide a safe venue for responsible motorized and nonmotorized recreation, and provide the county with much needed economic development by spurring the creation of new businesses and jobs, increasing the tax base and increasing spending in the local communities. The Pashek Associates official said economic development was the impetus for the project. He noted Bloomsburg University has agreed to study and report on the actual economic impact of the AOAA on the region as the plan is set in motion.

Bob Good, who is charge of financial planning with Pashek Associates, optimistically predicted that if everything falls into place and proper funding is secured for the project, the AOAA could open by early 2013.

Under the plan, Good said a municipal authority appointed by the county would manage the AOAA and be responsible for financially supporting it. He said the authority members would be paid with funds generated by the AOAA.

Good said the county would maintain ownership over the land and would be responsible for managing all non-recreational uses for the property.

Good said the AOAA would require hiring a full-time manager, full-time maintenance director, part-time administrative assistant, part-time seasonal maintenance staff and part-time seasonal and weekend admissions staff. He said volunteers could be used to support paid staff positions and additional staff could be hired if funds become available.

Based on his projection in comparing the AOAA with attendance at similar outdoor adventure areas in West Virginia and Kentucky, Good said the outdoor adventure area in Northumberland could generate \$5.2 million in revenue at the end of five years, while creating 184 new jobs. He anticipated the AOAA would generate \$238,000 in its first year of operation.

He said the financial objectives in developing the plan included making the AOAA a world-class facility that would attract thousands of people each year, keeping the admission fee affordable, making sure revenues outweigh expenses year after year, expanding the facility as more funding sources become available, establishing long-term stability, gaining support from local communities and having a significant positive economic impact on the area.

The master plan recommends providing a six-week opportunity for hunting by closing Monday through Saturday, beginning with the Saturday before Thanksgiving through the first week of January. That time frame would encompass a portion of the fall and winter small game season, bear, rifled deer and a portion of winter archery deer seasons, bobcat and a portion of the raccoon and fox seasons.

During the public input portion of the meeting, local real estate agent Joe Bressi stated, "Many years ago, there used to be a slogan that said, 'Come to Shamokin - City of Opportunity.' We can't afford to lose this opportunity. We must take advantage of this and work and cooperate with these folks who have put a lot of effort into this."

Bressi's remarks met with loud applause from the crowd, as did comments from Dick Lepley, executive director for the Pennsylvania Off-Highway Vehicle Association in Harrisburg who has 44 years of experience in the profession.

Lepley stated, "History shows that local businesses and communities thrive from outdoor adventure areas. I believe this project will rival the Hatfield-McCoy trails in West Virginia in terms of generating revenue and raising property values in the area. Motorized recreation also will preserve the great heritage of this area. It will serve as an economic engine for generations to come."

Dave Miller, president of the Lehigh Valley ATV Association, described the AOAA as a "revolutionary idea" that will become a huge attraction for the coal region. He commended county officials for their initiative in proposing the AOAA.

The vast majority of speakers voiced their support for the AOAA and one man even offered to pay his admission fee Wednesday night.

Good said the next step in the process is receiving a commitment from the county commissioners to move forward with the project.

Mack said he expects a final draft of the master plan to be presented to state officials by early December.

Vinny Clausi, who was the lone commissioner in attendance, reserved comment.

Clausi previously voiced his support for the project.

# Pack it in, Pack it out

Pack it in, Pack it out is just a saying to remind recreationists what to do about waste management outdoors. It is not an actual "program", but a very important state of mind.

Through Pack it in, Pack it out, UFWDA asks all our members to take away from their  $4 \times 4$  event or trail ride anything they brought to their  $4 \times 4$  event or trail ride.

Trash cans are rarely available in the middle of the woods, out on the rocks, and deep into the bush. By removing trash and waste that recreationists take onto the trail they will leave the environment in as good or better condition than they found it.

At UFWDA we ask that you Pack it in, Pack it out by practicing these steps:

- Bring trash bags with you so you can carry out your food and paper waste. Even something organic like a banana peel can take 3 or 4 weeks to decompose. Plastic and aluminum can take 10 years or longer to decompose.
- Do not bury food scraps, pack them out.
- Remove your solid human waste. You can make this process easier when you prepared before you go. If you are not using a commercial backcountry toileting system you can walk a distance from the trail and dig an appropriately deep "cat hole" for your solid waste and then bury your waste with dirt. If you're rest area is near water buried waste is not appropriate so take your waste with you using a plastic bag. Toilet paper waste should always be removed. Remember, the fly you see at dinner is the same fly that may have landed nearby where others have left their waste!
- When you take a break to eat take a few extra minutes and remove not only your own trash but trash left behind by others. •
